




Once upon a time

that she could hardly breathe.




But Adele Euphrasie Barbier didn't die. She was always small and skinny for her age and sometimes she had asthma




Sometimes at night Papa and Grandma told stories about countries far away where they used to live.




As she grew up Euphrasie had more and more ideas.








She travelled for days across France.













They cared for people who were poor and sad and in trouble of any kind. They educated children and women so that they could live good and happy lives.

The 'Missions' of their title refers to the Divine Missions of God's love, and the call and redemption of every person on earth.
